Priorities for 2011-2012

This year, HCFANY's Racial & Ethnic Disparities Task Force will be focusing work around the following priorities:

• Promoting language access in health coverage: In 2009, the NY Attorney General (AG) announced a landmark settlement with New York's largest pharmacy chains, like Duane Reade, CVS, and Rite Aid, requiring them to provide free translation of medicine labels. The NYC Council also passed legislation to guarantee interpretation in all NYC pharmacies.

However, state policymakers still need to adopt statewide legislation to require what was outlined in the AG settlement. In addition, New York should adopt a statewide standardization of medication labels, to help streamline translations.

Further, HCFANY recommends that a statewide policy be issued to require that all state agencies provide language assistance services to limited English proficient individuals, including necessary interpreter services and the translation of frequently used forms and documents.

• Requiring uniform data collection and reporting: Reliable data is the key to identifying disparities and designing targeted quality improvement interventions. New York does not currently require all health care providers to collect and report quality of care data stratified by race, ethnicity, and other background information.

While some providers do collect this data, it is not standardized throughout the state. This can make it difficult to compare across entities. In addition,

data collected is generally not publicly reported.

New York should require uniform collection and public reporting of data stratified by race, ethnicity, disability status, gender, sexual orientation, and language spoken throughout the state by all public and private health plans, hospitals, and other health care institutions

• Promoting cultural competency training for medical professionals:

A lack of culturally and linguistically appropriate services leads to poor quality of care and health disparities. HCFANY would support a bill that: 1) requires at least 8 hours of cultural competency training for medical professionals; 2) includes a minimum definition of cultural competency; 3) includes specific accreditation requirements for cultural competency courses; 4) clearly defines acceptable reasons for waivers; 5) includes penalties for reinstating physician licenses for non-compliance; 6) incorporates cultural competency into the medical school curriculum.

• Promoting Community Health Centers: As part of ACA implementation, we support the development and expansion of community health centers in marginalized and underserved communities. We also want to ensure that such development and expansion provides transparent processes, engages community members and providers, supports a workforce expansion that is racially and ethnically diverse, and improves local health care systems.
