## The Current Debate

Unless Congress takes action to renew CHIP funding, 630,000 New York children and millions of children across the nation could lose access to quality, affordable health care. Congress must act now to establish a permanent source of funding for the Children's Health Insurance Program. Federal funding for the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) expires on September 30, 2017. New York State will exhaust its federal funding for Child Health Plus in March 2018 without Congressional action.

# **CHIP and New York**

**The strength of the CHP program along with Medicaid has allowed New York to achieve a historic high of 98 percent coverage for kids.** New York's first in the nation Child Health Insurance Plan, now known as Child Health Plus (CHP), was established in 1990—seven years before the federal CHIP program. New York operates a "combination" CHIP program, which includes a Medicaid expansion for children as well as the separate CHP program with about 300,000 children enrolled in each. New York is also one of the only states to cover all children regardless of immigration status using state-only funds. Twenty years later, New York has universal health coverage for children.
